Course description: This first semester seminar course for doctoral students in public health to introduce students to the academic field of health research. The purpose of the course is to a) provide students with a strong foundation on strategies for success as a doctoral student and b) an understanding of the history of public health, including ethical challenges both past and present. The class meets weekly for 1 hour.

Prerequisites: Enrollment in a public health doctoral program.

Course Format: The course uses a seminar format. Each session has an assigned topic or is student led and the topic is chosen by the students. Each topic is associated with articles, chapters, webinars and/or other resources. The sessions will either have a short presentation, followed by discussion, or discussion for the entire hour. All course materials will be posted on Carmen.

Students will be required to lead one session in pairs. If we have an odd number of students, one session will have 3 students. For the student-led sessions, the student pair must identify the topic, receive approval from the instructor, select the readings, and lead the discussion for 20 minutes.

Course Objectives: After completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the importance of having a mentor and create a mentoring plan.
- 2. Describe conflicts and ethical dilemmas which can arise in professional life, and strategies and principles which may help quide conduct.
- 3. Explain the importance of public health history for current understanding current health problems and potential approaches.

PhD Core Competencies:

1. Explain how the core public health concepts of biostatistics, epidemiology, environmental health, health behavior/health promotion, and health administration relate to the student's area of specialization.

Grading: Fifty percent of your S/U grade will be based on your own contributions to the class discussion and discussion board. Fifty percent of your grade will be based on the quality of your leadership of class discussion.

Carmen:

There is a Carmen site for this course: https://carmen.osu.edu. All course materials are available via Carmen.

You will need to use BuckeyePass (<u>buckeyepass.osu.edu</u>) multi-factor authentication to access your courses in Carmen. To ensure that you are able to connect to Carmen at all times, it is recommended that you take the following steps:

If none of these options will meet the needs of your situation, you can contact the IT Service Desk at 614-688-4357(HELP) and IT support staff will work out a solution with you.

Participation Policy: Your presence is expected at all classes. If students have an *extenuating* circumstance (e.g. unforeseen medical issues, death in the family, etc.) that prevents them from attending class, they should notify the instructor *before* class. **Students may not miss more than one session without prior approval of the instructor.**

Given that this course is a seminar, I also encourage you to limit your laptop use to the papers being discussed. Religious Beliefs or Practices Accommodations

Ohio State has had a longstanding practice of making reasonable academic accommodations for students' religious beliefs and practices in accordance with applicable law. In 2023, Ohio State updated its practice to align with new state legislation. Under this new provision, students must be in early communication with their instructors regarding any known accommodation requests for religious beliefs and practices, providing notice of specific dates for which they request alternative accommodations within 14 days after the first instructional day of the course. Instructors in turn shall not question the sincerity of a student's religious or spiritual belief system in reviewing such requests and shall keep requests for accommodations confidential.

With sufficient notice, instructors will provide students with reasonable alternative accommodations with regard to examinations and other academic requirements with respect to students' sincerely held religious beliefs and practices by allowing up to three absences each semester for the student to attend or participate in religious activities. Examples of religious accommodations can include, but are not limited to, rescheduling an exam, altering the time of a student's presentation, allowing make-up assignments to substitute for missed class work, or flexibility in due dates or research responsibilities. If concerns arise about a requested accommodation, instructors are to consult their tenure initiating unit head for assistance.

A student's request for time off shall be provided if the student's sincerely held religious belief or practice severely affects the student's ability to take an exam or meet an academic requirement and the student has notified their instructor, in writing during the first 14 days after the course begins, of the date of each absence. Although students are required to provide notice within the first 14 days after a course begins, instructors are strongly encouraged to work with the student to provide a reasonable accommodation if a request is made outside the notice period. A student may not be penalized for an absence approved under this policy.

If students have questions or disputes related to academic accommodations, they should contact their course instructor, and then their department or college office. For questions or to report discrimination or harassment based on religion, individuals should contact the <u>Civil Rights Compliance Office</u>. (Policy: Religious Holidays, Holy Days and Observances)

Academic Misconduct

It is the responsibility of the Committee on Academic Misconduct to investigate or establish procedures for the investigation of all reported cases of student academic misconduct. The term "academic misconduct" includes all forms of student academic misconduct wherever committed; illustrated by, but not limited to, cases of plagiarism and dishonest practices in connection with examinations. Instructors shall report all instances of alleged academic misconduct to the committee (<u>Faculty Rule 3335-5-48.7</u> (B)). For additional information, see the Code of Student Conduct.

Grievances and Solving Problems

A student who encounters a problem related to his/her educational program has a variety of avenues available to seek resolution. According to University Policies, if you have a problem with this class, you should seek to resolve the grievance concerning a grade or academic practice by speaking first with the instructor or professor. Then, if necessary, you may take your case to the department chairperson. Specific procedures are outlined in Faculty Rule 3335-8-23, the CPH Graduate Student Handbook, and the CPH Undergraduate Student Handbook. Grievances against graduate, research, and teaching assistants should be submitted first to the supervising instructor, then to the chairperson of the assistant's department.
