<u>Course Description:</u> This course is designed for PhD students in the Division of Epidemiology. The purpose of this course is to examine contemporary methods in epidemiology for causal inference and understand their appropriate applications. The course will focus on development of intuitive thinking about counterfactuals and causal inference in observational settings. Readings will include methods descriptions and applications of the selected methods. Topics may vary from one year to the next. Students will consider how the methods could be used in their own substantive areas.

Course Objectives: In this course, students will:

- 1. Identify appropriate analytical methods for specific research questions.
- 2. Describe the appropriate role of causal methods in epidemiology.
- 3. Describe the methods-related challenges in descriptive epidemiology.

PhD Core Competencies:

- 2. Synthesize and critique existing literature in student's area of specialization to identify gaps in the evidence base and justify their importance for public health.
- 4. Formulate hypotheses, plan and conduct a research study using appropriate research methods, and ethical approaches.
- 5. Analyze data and prepare an original manuscript, suitable for publication, summarizing the results and interpret the findings from a research study
- 6. Communicate in writing and orally a research study's purpose, methods, results, limitations, conclusions and public health relevance to both informed and lay audiences.

Additional Competencies for Students with a Specialization in Epidemiology

- Identify and address potential sources of bias, including selection bias, measurement error, and confounding, in both the design and analysis phases of epidemiological studies.
- 2. Demonstrate understanding of the content and issues in at least one specific substantive area of epidemiology.

<u>Course Format:</u> The course uses a seminar format. Some classes involve a didactic presentation, followed by discussion among the group. Readings and activities will be assigned for completion prior to class.

Class Format: How this online course works

- Mode of delivery: This course is in-person with synchronous class meetings each
 week. The class sessions will incorporate lectures, discussion of readings and student
 presentations. You will find the sequence of materials and activities in the Module
 Section of Carmen.
- Pace of online activities: This course is divided into weekly modules that are released one week ahead of time.
- Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 1-credit-hour course. According to
 Ohio State policy (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 1 hours per
 week of time spent on direct instruction (class meetings) in addition to 2 hours of
 homework/active learning activities (reading, assignments, and presentation
 preparation).
- Attendance and participation requirements: Consistent class attendance is expected. Attendance will be verified by participation in class activities. Participation is critical and contributes to a dynamic and stimulating learning environment.

Readings:

Text/Readings: Readings will be posted on Carmen. The book "**The Effect**" available here: https://theeffectbook.net/ch-UndertheRug.html) by Nick Huntington-Klein will serve as the foundational text for this course. We will use example datasets and code from various publicly available resources for classroom demonstration of specific methods. You are encouraged to use these sources for self-practice in methods of your interest. The main resources include: (1) The World Bank's **Impact Evaluation in Practice** eBook (posted on Carmen and available online here: https://www.worldbank.org/en/programs/sief-trust-fund/publication/impact-evaluation-in-practice) and

(2) Scott Cunningham's **Causal Inference: The Mixtape** (available online here: https://mixtape.scunning.com/ index.html). Articles and published papers for select topics will be made available on Carmen. For interested students who wish to delve deeper into causal inference in epidemiology, I recommend **Causal Inference: What If** by Miguel Hernan & Jamie Robins (available online here: https://www.hsph.harvard.edu/miguel-hernan/causal-inference-book/) as an *optional resource*.

A student will be given a grade of "Incomplete" only if they have completed most of the class work and are unable to complete the work for a serious reason beyond their control. In 2023, Ohio State updated its practice to align with new state legislation. Instructors in turn shall not question the sincerity of a student's religious or spiritual belief system in reviewing such requests and shall keep requests for accommodations confidential.

With sufficient notice, instructors will provide students with reasonable alternative accommodations with regard to examinations and other academic requirements with respect to students' sincerely held religious beliefs and practices by allowing up to three absences each semester for the student to attend or participate in religious activities. Examples of religious accommodations can include, but are not limited to, rescheduling an exam, altering the time of a student's presentation, allowing make-up assignments to substitute for missed class work, or

flexibility in due dates or research responsibilities. If concerns arise about a requested accommodation, instructors are to consult their tenure initiating unit head for assistance.

A student's request for time off shall be provided if the student's sincerely held religious belief or practice severely affects the student's ability to take an exam or meet an academic requirement and the student has notified their instructor, in writing during the first 14 days after the course begins, of the date of each absence. Although students are required to provide notice within the first 14 days after a course begins, instructors are strongly encouraged to work with the student to provide a reasonable accommodation if a request is made outside the notice period. A student may not be penalized for an absence approved under this policy.
